Curated by Professor Julia Robinson, *Dutch Complex Housing* explores a special form of multi-family dwelling developed in response to its location and socially responsible policy.

In the Netherlands, where housing is a right, cities include a unique architectural form - complex housing. These structures were developed in response to concerns for density, ecology, mixed incomes, mixed housing types, and the urban context plus a combination of units for purchase, for rent, and non-housing functions. Explore how this Dutch housing evolved through profiles of eight very different case studies. Can this innovative housing be replicated elsewhere?

Dutch Complex Housing presents this content in four parts:

- An introduction to housing in the Netherlands
- An introduction to typological methodology used to study housing
- The eight examples - De Muzen, Silodam, De Zilvervloot, Carnisselande, Virjburcht, La Grande Cour, De Opgang, De Beeklaan
- Principles that generate this type of housing and its potential for replicability elsewhere

An accompanying symposium, entitled *Complexity: Dutch and American Housing Symposium*, will take place over 2 -1/2 days beginning on Friday, October 6, and ending on Sunday October 8, 2017. The symposium will bring together design professionals, developers and policy-makers from the Netherlands and the USA who are involved in the design of housing with the intention to learn best practices from the approaches taken in the Netherlands and the United States for improving the planning, design and construction of housing.

Parking

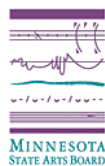
