Donna E. Shalala

Donna Shalala served as Secretary of Health and Human Services during the Clinton Administration. At the end of her tenure, *The Washington Post* described her as "one of the most successful government managers of modern times." Shalala received her Ph.D. in 1970 from the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University. She was Chancellor at the University of Wisconsin, Madision, from 1987 to 1993, and President of Hunter College of the City University of New York from 1980 to 1987. Dr. Shalala is now President of the University of Miami.

Candidates for Degrees

This program contains the names of College of Human Ecology students who have applied to graduate from fall semester 2001 through summer 2002. This is not an official University of Minnesota graduation list.

To graduate with *distinction*, a student must have a cumulative GPA of 3.75 or higher at graduation. To graduate with *high distinction*, a student must have a cumulative GPA of 3.90 or higher. Graduation with designated Latin honors (*cum laude*, *magna cum laude*, *summa cum laude*) is limited to students who participate in the College of Human Ecology Upper Division Honors Program. Students must complete at least two academic honors options, a capstone project, and in their last 60 University of Minnesota credits maintain a 3.50 GPA for *cum laude*, a 3.66 GPA for *magna cum laude*, and a 3.75 GPA for *summa cum laude* honors. Candidates for academic honors are noted in this program.

• Phi Upsilon Omicron is a national honor society recognizing and encouraging achieved excellence in scholarship, leadership, and service in the fields of family and consumer sciences. It was founded on February 10, 1909 here at the University of Minnesota (the alpha chapter) and is represented today by more than 60 collegiate chapters and 40 alumni chapters with 80,000 members. Phi Upsilon Omicron members are denoted in the program with • after their name.

College of Human Ecology Initiatives

Each of the College's initiatives serves as a foundation for the research and teaching of our faculty. As members of the College of Human Ecology's community, our faculty bring together a diverse background of expertise, experiences, and interests. Scholarship and faculty interests within each unit intersect and impact the College's five initiatives. Below are short descriptions of the initiatives. The following pages include examples of faculty research and discovery that impact public policy.

Health and Nutrition

The study of health and nutrition has been a part of the College of Human Ecology since 1900. Over the past century, research has grown to include a diverse set of issues that impact public policy, including human health, nutrition, chronic diseases, and food safety as it relates to our communities and environments.

Design and Technology

The impact of technology and design on the quality of life around the state of Minnesota is extraordinary. College of Human Ecology research in areas of design and technology influence the accessibility, comfort, health, and the usefulness of the places in which our families and communities live, work, and play.

Cultural Competence

The increase in immigration and migration of diverse ethnic, cultural, racial, religious, social, and economic groups to different communities around the state of Minnesota demands cultural competence and respect. Research within the College's different units acknowledges and is sensitive to a diversity of people and communities. Many of our faculty strive to include cultural competence in their scholarly work, research, and teaching. More often than not, this type of competence leads to wonderful discoveries that serve as catalysts that change and positively affect public policy.

Economic and Social Well-being

In Minnesota, families and communities who are on the edge of economic and social well-being face considerable barriers related to nutrition, affordable housing, and clothing, as well as access to education and community services. The enhancement of quality of life in our families and communities through the improvement of economic and social well-being is a core component of the College. As social capital continues to decrease and economic disparity continues to increase, CHE will continue its strong tradition of addressing equity and social justice for all members of our communities.

Development Across Lifespan

With a strong tradition of understanding and embracing integrative issues, the College of Human Ecology contributes in valuable ways to the various issues related to the development of human beings across the lifespan. Our faculty's research and teaching addresses the changing needs of humans in relation to their environments, which often impact public policy issues.
